## Ours and others evidence recognises the academic attainment gap is a result of multiple conditions;

- A change of learning environment and curriculum progression
- Different expectations of our teaching approaches and assessments
- Access to a more diverse range of learning resources and services, with an increased requirement to engage in self-directed learning
- Having to make new friends in larger cohort groups
- Cultural value (perception) placed on vocational qualifications as a route into HE

## The University of Lincoln's Building Bridges to Success project (3-year timeline) aims to;

- Recognise these and then develop support systems to encourage all to reach their potential.
- Explore educational experiences across the secondary-to-tertiary transition and how this translates to the academic and student experience.


## In addressing these, we have had to consider some critical issues;


