"Retention is as important as access"

The UCAS End of cycle report 2017 shows us that UK 18 year old students holding BTEC qualifications has grown year on year with more than ever being accepted to medium and higher tariff institutions.

However, much needs to be done to prepare these students for the world of HE and to support them once they are placed.

Setting the scene

- What prior qualifications are students holding? (UK)
 - 60.6% A Levels only
 - 11.1% BTECs only
 - 7.9% BTEC and A Level combination
- National retention 6.3% of young undergraduate students dropped out of their first year studies before the start of year 2 in 2014/15
 - SMF, On course for success? Student retention at university (2017)
- There is a greater need for transparency from universities in published information about the content of courses so that students can make suitable and aspirational choices during the application process.

Actions

Widened summer opportunities

- One Day workshops
- Target vulnerable populations
 - Eg. Unsuccessful applicants to SSSS / Clearing students / Deferrals / Direct Entry

2016 – 2017 Level 3 cohort

Involvement in School-wide L3 module.

Extended Induction

- Introduction to HE and Study Skills to all level 3 & 4 students
- Engagement Team / Library / Careers / IT Services

What do we do?

Academic (and personal) Drop-ins

- Daily
- One-to-one
- No appointment needed

Academic Workshops

- 3 5 workshops a week
- 2 Hours: 1st hour theoretical. 2nd Hour Practical (Student led, facilitated by staff)
- No appointment needed

Peer Mentoring

Other Activities and Opportunities

Outreach

- Targeted phone calls & emails to students who are "at risk" due to low engagement.
 - Non-Attendance
 - Non-Submission
 - Mitigating circumstances
 - Known cohorts (late enrolments, clearing students, low entry qualifications etc.)

'Shared Experiences'

- A platform for open discussion
 - Dyspraxia
 - BAME
 - Future plans Mature & Student Parents / Commuting students

Current Profile of Service Users in 2017/18: BAME students

- The Drop-in Support Service has been visited by over 500 students, with over 1200 visits, in 2017-18 to date.
- 73% of these students were BAME students, predominantly Black (46%), which is higher than the overall university percentages of 55% BAME and 29% Black.
- Academic Skills Workshops are proving popular with 406 individual attendees and 660 visits overall. 73% of this population are also BAME students and Black students in particular (49%).
- Over 50% of both Drop-in and Workshop attendees are from L3 & L4.

Current Profile of Service Users in 2017/18: Age of Students

Drop-ins:

- 20.6% of Drop-in Support visitors are aged between 30-39 years, compared to the overall university percentage of 16.2%.
- 26.5% of visitors are 40+years, compared to overall university percentages of 13.6%.

Academic Skills Workshops:

- 22% of Workshop visitors are aged between 30-39 years, compared to the overall university percentage of 16.2%.
- 36% of visitors are 40+years, compared to overall university percentages of 13.6%.
